## Governance, Transparency and Ethical Behaviour

## Q 1 Are you aware of the Principles listed at the beginning of the Local Government Act 2009 and will you commit to abiding by these principles?

I think the principles are a baseline standard that every councillor and candidate should support, regardless of their particular political stances or opinions. Ultimately I think they could be summarised by saying that councillors should, to the best of their ability and judgement, act in the long-term best interests of the community, not just particular sections of it, and certainly not of themselves. I have always endeavored to make sure that everyone in my community is represented.

## Q 2a What are the relevant legislation and regulations that govern the conduct of councillors and the activities of council?

### Response:

There are too many to list. Clearly the Local Government Act, the Local Government Electoral Act and the Planning Act lay out a lot of the basics. Over my 8 years in council there have been many pieces of legislation relevant to council activities, from the Corporations Act to the Native Title Act.

### Q 2b How will these impact your decision-making?

#### Response:

I am not a lawyer, and councillors are not expected to be lawyers, but we of course recieve legal advice on our options by council's legal team on a regular basis. I always endeavor to follow the legal advice we are given, but also to question it and get clarification or other opinions when that legal advice seems to prevent me from acting on behalf of the community.

#### Response:

It would depend on the specifics. Depending on the severity and whether the problem seemed to be intentional, my actions could range from raising the issue with the mayor, the other councillors, or the council executive to reporting my concerns to the Crime and Corruption Commission of Queensland.

When the public would be significantly disadvantaged by the meeting being public. For example, last year I proposed that council should go to auction to buy a particular building in Landsborough with significant heritage value. If that meeting had been public, the owners could have seen the price council was willing to pay and it would have to have been tempting for them to try to drive the price up at the auction knowing that the council officers were authorised to bid to a certain point. As it was, council (and therefore ratepayers) got the building at significantly less than we were authorised to pay.

I definately support them becoming public (and I think the public will be happy with what they see - I think the confidentiality is actually fuelling speculation that there are many problems that don't exist or are a lot less serious in reality). However the reality is that the details, notes and recordings would probably have to be released over time - these sorts of contracts and commercial dealings can be very complex and negotiations can be ongoing after a decision to proceed has been made. We have to make sure that the interests of the ratepayers are served and our private partners don't get an unfair advantage in negotiations. I do support as much transparency as is consistent with that principle.

Q 10 What do you mean by, and how would you measure, sustainable development?

Response:

Environmentally, sustainable development should have minimal impact on the local ecosystem. Economically, growth should be at a pace that can be continued for an extended period of time, not a quick boom followed by a bust. Development should be in keeping with the character of the local region and should reflect the values of the local community. Care should be taken that development is well planned so that any new residents can easily integrate into the community and not be too isolated. Developments should consider the interests of more vulnerable groups and people who may have mobility issues, such as the elderly and people with disabilities.

Sea level rises potentially threaten the viability of residences in some areas of the coast.

#### Response:

We should have a clear plan to reduce our impact on the climate, and we should work with other councils and other levels of government to coordinate action. While global action is needed to truly address climate change, we can play a small part in building and reinforcing the necessary consensus. We also need to make sure that resilience to climate change is built into our planning for the future. We need to see ourselves as guardians of the local ecology, and work to understand it and have a goal to increase habitat over time, to counter-balance some of the negative effects of climate change.

I believe that to override the planning scheme there must be major community benefits beyond simply the employment inherently created by the project. For example, if a significant contribution to public infrastructure would be made (beyond what would ordinarily be required), or the development has significant benefit to an underserved group (for example people with disabilities). In these cases council would have to consider whether the benefit outweighs the impacts on the community.

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Q 21 The floodplains of the Sunshine Coast have been extensively filled primarily for urban development. This has increased the risk to people, property, infrastructure and the environment from coastal inundation and flooding and contributes to greater exposure to extreme weather events associated with climate change.

Planning instruments, State Planning regulation and various reports give regulatory and guidance material regarding floodplain management with land-use one of the key areas to avoid and manage risk.

#### Response:

Yes, and I believe council should be strict and sceptical when evaluating developer proposals for flood mitigation. I have opposed several proposals because I was not convinced that flooding issues could be adequately addressed

in the locations involved, and I will continue to do so.

#### Response:

I would be happy to raise this as a discussion point in our planning scheme deliberations, but I would have to be guided by our expert officers as to the consequences before committing to support it.

#### Response:

I will be guided by the experts in the detail, but I certainly believe we need to be reducing, not increasing risk. I think this issue should be a major topic of discussion in the next planning scheme and we should recieve a detailed report on it that should guide our decisions.

#### General

Q 26 The Sunshine Coast Regional Council ratepayers have been consistently hit with annual rate increases much higher than the region's CPI. How would you address this?

#### Response:

As our major projects (such as the airport upgrade) near completion, the pressure on our budget (and therefore rates) will naturally go down. I have always supported councillors going through the budget in depth to reduce unnecessary spending, and would continue to do so. I believe all proposals need to go through a detailed analysis of costs and benefits, and where the costs can't be justified, the proposal should be rejected, and this is the approach I try to stick to in council.

#### Response:

I will consult with the community and fight for projects that benefit our area. Some of my specific goals include tackling congestion (especially on Caloundra Road), securing a rail system for our region going through Aura, securing the next stages of the Landsborough Masterplan, a major streetscape project for Glass House Mountains, a new community hub and library extension for Beerwah, and delivering the community's vision for Peachester's new park.

#### Q 32 Why do you think that you are the best candidate for your Division or as Mayor?

#### Response:

I've shown I can can get results on the ground. Over the last term, I've delivered Glass House Mountains District Park, the Baringa Community Centre and the Beerwah Aquatic Centre upgrade, secured the Landsborough Township upgrade stage 1, secured the purchase of the Landsborough corner store for a future Heritage Precinct, delivered the new Peachester shelter and amenities block and the Beerburrum trailhead and much more. I'm asking for the community's support so I can be at the table to argue for more projects for our area.
