4. As a result of changes to the Planning Act 2016 over the last few years, the vast majority of development applications in Queensland are now Code Assessable. The Act requires the approval of a code assessable development application if it complies with all of the Local Planning Scheme's code assessment benchmarks - ie the three measurable components of each applicable Planning Scheme code - Overall Outcomes, the Performance Outcomes, and the Acceptable Outcomes.

However, the Act now gives the assessment manager (usually the local council) subjective discretion to approve development that does not comply with all code benchmarks by imposing approval conditions that they consider overcome non-compliance with some intended code outcomes. As a result, development approvals and conditions are frequently made which conflict in important respects with the intended outcomes of the codes in a Planning Scheme. Furthermore, unlike decisions on impact assessable development applications, there are no formal submission rights for code applications and no third party (public) rights to a merit review of code approvals through the Planning and Environment Court while developers can appeal when an application is refused.

These problems can be rectified by amending the Act and by adding a new section allowing a limited right of third party appeal to the Development Tribunal for an independent review of non-standard development conditions applied to code assessable development approvals that deviate from the intended outcomes of a code. The latter limited right of review will help ensure transparency, integrity, accountability, and professionalism in assessment decision-making without incurring the cost and delays associated with proceedings in the Planning and Environment Court.

More than 3 storeys should never have been allowed on Parkyn Parade. The carrying capacity of the road network in the area is already unable to carry traffic at many times of the day, with huge problems in Summer. Further increases to the number of existing High density MDUs would only make things worse.
