Climate Emergency

 What do you see as the key impacts of Climate Change on the Sunshine Coast and how should Noosa Council deal with this now and into the future?

Comment: There are many impacts of climate change! The one I have focussed on is local agriculture and creating resilient food production. I know how fragile our food chains are. Running out of food is a climate change reality and growing our own on our degraded, wildly underutilized agriculture land is a key climate change response. I was president of Permaculture Noosa from 2021 to 2023. Regenerative agriculture is now in Noosa's Corporate Plan, Climate Change Response Plan and Economic Strategy.

Not eating vitamin rich, super healthy, locally grown food is an abomination. I am advocating for radical change.

 Do you endorse the Climate Change Emergency Declaration made by the Council in 2019 and will you advocate for a review of its scope, effectiveness, transparency and accountability to give effect to the Declaration?

Comment: From the fires of 2019 and floods of 2022, Noosa has \$149 million of disaster relief funding from the state and federal governments. This speaks for itself.

 What role do you see for the Noosa Council and its Planning Scheme to accelerate the LGA achieving net zero emissions by 2026?

Comment:

Noosa is looking at the Resource Recovery Centre (tip) as the key to zero emissions. We can put solar panels on the filled cells. We can turn wood waste to biochar. We can sequester green waste through regenerative farming practices. The answers are staring us in the face. If the right people are elected, we will make this happen.

We may never go against the guiding principles, but can make some seemingly conflicted decisions when the details are not consistent with the guiding principles in some circumstances. For example, the details of the planning scheme made STA supported in high and medium density areas. I was voted down 6:1 when I voted to refuse the DA applications. However, I read the planning scheme principles which state that STA may not deteriorate the amenity of residential neighbourhoods nor become predominantly STAs. Eventually, Staff and councillors followed my reasoning.

Covid has changed our world. Our planning scheme is now interpreted in a different time. Overwhelming public interest may lead to decisions which were not anticipated by the pre-covid planning scheme.
